Share the TRUTH of Jesus

"But his wife's sickness continued, so friends and neighbors came to sit with her around the clock. To feed them, the farmer butchered the pig. The farmer's wife did not get well; she died. So many people came for her funeral, the farmer had the cow slaughtered to provide enough meat for all of them. The mouse looked upon it all from his crack in the wall with great sadness.

"There is a mousetrap in the house and although none of us may struggle with this issue, sooner or later we will be faced with the consequences of this problem. It's time for the house of God to pray and repent and turn to God for His divine protection instead of turning a blind eye. It's time for us as believers to take responsibility for the healing that needs to take place just as Jesus did as He walked the earth. We are His hands, His feet, His mouth!"

Stewardship Corner

Who Gives the Most?

I would like to pose three scenarios: The first one is this: In today's offering, you place a check for 50.00. Second: a 9th grader sitting close to you tosses in a dollar. Third: the person right in front of you puts in a check for 300.00. The question is this: Who gave the most?

Now let us go back in time and observe a Pharisee who walks through the inner court of the temple and tosses into the temple treasury a bag of gold. Then shift your focus to a widow who slips in almost unnoticed and places two small copper coins into the same temple treasury. Who gave the most?

The answer is found in Jesus' Words: "'I tell you the truth,' He said, 'this poor widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on'" (Luke 21:4).

You see, God does not measure our gifts by the size of the gifts, but according to the condition of our hearts. God knows when giving is given out of faith, love, and gratitude for His countless blessings that He gives to us. Not only does He know the priorities of our hearts, but He also knows the giving capabilities that we have. When we give our offerings, He knows what we are keeping for ourselves, and He knows if we are giving sacrificially of what we have. Only as our relationship with Jesus grows will we be able to give greater proportions of what we receive.

Proportionate giving is fair to the rich and the poor. A person who earns \$10,000 and gives \$1,000 is giving the same proportion as a person who earns \$100,000 and gives \$10,000.

Going back to our original scenarios, wouldn't we agree that the person who gave \$300.00 gave the most? Certainly \$300 is greater than the dollar given by the 9th grader. However, from God's perspective, the 9th grader with the one dollar may have given a more meaningful gift than the person who gave \$300. If the dollar is given from a loving and grateful heart and if it represents a generous proportion of the youngster's income, the gift will please God. A gift of \$300 could sadden the Lord if it is given without faith and if it represents only a token amount of one's income. Jesus said, *"From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked"* (Luke 12:48).

May God grant us the same faith as He did the widow so we, too, can give proportionately, generously, and perhaps even sacrificially.

Christian Citizenship

"Ye are the salt of the earth." Matthew 5:13

Today [July 4] the citizens of the United States are celebrating its birthday. What should be our distinctive role in this celebration? As grateful children of our heavenly Father we will, of course, want to thank Him for the uncounted blessings He has showered on our land. Truly, He has blessed us beyond measure.

But we will want to do more than merely give thanks. Our Lord, who gave His life for us, has told us that we are to be "the salt of the earth." That applies not only to our private lives as individual Christians but also to our civic lives as Christian citizens. Many sincere believers feel uncomfortable when it comes to taking part in governmental affairs. This is due, in many cases, to a lifelong misconception of the idea od "separation of Church and state." Having rendered to God the things that are God's, he must also discharge his rightful obligations to the community in which he lives.

How desperately our nation needs the salt of Christian witness and action! Dishonesty, greed, profanity, divorce, and sins of sexual impurity are all about us. In concert with other God-fearing citizens we are to do all within our power to stay the spread of moral decay which threatens our land. Salt that is not applied is worthless. We are to pray, to speak, to work for the welfare of the lad we love. Are we doing that?

Lord, while for all mankind we pray, Of every clime and coast, Oh, hear us for our native land, The land we love the most. Amen.

Ideas have Consequences: Why Bad Ideas can Bring Real Devastation by Rev. Dr. Gregory Seltz

A two-kingdom perspective about how God is at work in the world brings a certain sanctified "common sense" to many of the issues we struggle with today. If one studies history, or even gets involved in trying to make this world a better place, one learns very fast that things are broken. (Den that reality to everyone's peril.) Even the good things that we seem to accomplish bring consequences of which we weren't aware. (That's one reason that cultural iconic commentator Thomas Sowell warns that in politics, there are NO solutions, just tradeoffs.) A two-kingdom perspective on how to preserve the world even as God saves it, realizes that human beings are sinful and bent towards evil by nature. All our efforts that we offer to overcome our failings and make things right tend to get skewed along the way. Therefore, "the quest for perfection" is often the enemy of a better (not perfect) solution." And, there will be times we all face the reality that there is no "good solution" to an issue, but there is the lessor of two evil ones, that will require action and forgiveness, even with the best of intentions.

For that reason, we must be aware of the foolishness that seems to be invading our college campuses. In our history, Americans have always suffered a propensity to pietism, the notion that WE could create a perfect society. It stems from our puritan roots. But, today, secularism, wealth, and technology especially cause us to overestimate our ability to do what's right, while underestimating the damage our propensity to evil brings in society too. Sadly, unmoored from any moral restraint today, some of the most horrific damage done in society is ironically done when people think that they are passionately doing the "right thing."

Marxist thought is built on the premise that human beings aren't sinful or evil by nature, it is the structures of our world that are evil. If those evil structures are removed (even if by violence), and pure, just, and egalitarian structures are put in their place, "good people" WILL be good to one another the way they were meant to be. Intersectionality is one of those ways of masking the notion of structural, not personal change, as if that will solve our problems.

So what's the point? Utopian intentions tend to bring tyrannical, despotic results. Say what you will about the violence caused by religion in history. It's nothing compared to the violence and murder perpetuated by the likes of Hitler, Stalin, Mao, and Mussolini, or Hamas on Oct. 7, all seeking the perfect

structure for the perfect society. With a common sense view of the heart of people (including ourselves), with a knowledge of our propensity to evil in amidst the best of circumstance, public service is a "tradeoffs endeavor seeking the most good," with a human knowledge that even our best efforts may be a lessor of two evils, needing action and forgiveness both. With that in mind we can strive to think as the Bible teaches "to think about others more highly than ourselves" and seek to serve others with that wisdom and strength.

Millions of people in the United States and around the world are suffering with mental illnesses and disorders. There is a tremendous need and opportunity

for Lutheran outreach to both the people struggling with mental issues and their family members, so they may receive the Gospel of Jesus Christ. However, pastors, church workers, and lay leaders are challenged in dealing with these problems because they do not have enough training to provide effective and appropriate care.

Public health researchers have conducted studies that indicate people with mental illnesses or disorders are more likely to approach a pastor or professional church worker than a medical doctor or counselor. A mental illness or mental disorder has a downward spiral effect in families that may include behavioral malfunctions, addictions, marital problems leading to divorce, loss of job, incarceration, and suicide. Training and outreach for mental illnesses and disorders are effective in assisting more people to get the help that they need.

The LCMS Task Force for Mental Illness, Health, and Wellness collaborating with expert LCMS contributors, with the help of grant funds, will develop materials, resources, and training programs. LCMS Life Ministry will coordinate the production of materials and rollout the training.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League, meeting in convention in June 2023, granted the sum of \$96,500.00 to enable the LCMS Task Force for Mental Illness, Health, and Wellness to develop these materials, resources, and training programs.
