LORD, Save Us from S.I.N.

Dear Ones in Christ,

The following is another one of those messages that, "I wish I'd said that!"

"Are Christians an endangered species? This is really not the most pleasant question to consider. But at some time or another I would imagine we have all thought about it.

"Faced with an uncomfortable question, we find comfort and assurance in God's Word. Speaking of Jesus, in John 1:5 (GNB) it says, 'His life is the light that shines through the darkness – and the darkness can never extinguish it.' Never, it says. The power of God's light can never be extinguished. The good news about Jesus will always be good news. Sin will have its triumphs, but it never will completely prevail.

"Most of the danger of Christianity does not come from the outside but from within. I would like to consider with you three of the dangers from within referring to them as Christianity's sin from within.

"There is the <u>endangering problem of self-centeredness</u> or the S of sin from within. Often, we get so caught up with our own church or our own denomination that our world view of Christianity doesn't go much beyond our congregation's front door. In our quest to preserve our peculiar understanding of Scripture, we often fail to bask in the good news of a Christ who stands at the center of Scripture. The New Testament abounds with encouragement for us to one with each other – to rejoice in that which unites us in the Body of Christ rather than to dwell upon our theological idiosyncrasies. It is incompatible with Christianity for us to separate ourselves from other Christians in order to do just our own thing. We are going to spend our eternity with all these people. The time to get acquainted and work together is now.

"Another aspect of the problem is <u>inhibited love</u>. Inhibited love is the I of the sin from within. There is no virtue in loving someone who is lovable. Anyone can do that – even non-believers. There is no virtue in loving someone with whom we agree, that is almost like loving ourself.

"Jesus said, 'If you love only those who love you, what good is that? Even scoundrels do that much.' But there is virtue in uninhibited, unconditional love. We are called by Jesus to embrace with forgiving love a brother or sister who has disappointed or even offended us. Forgiveness flows in a church when the Spirit of God resides in its members.

"Love that flows freely is the love that Jesus spoke about when he said, 'Love your enemies! Pray for those who persecute you. In that way you will be acting as true sons of your Father in heaven.'

"The final sin from within, represented by the N in sin, is <u>nonchalance</u>. Too many of us take our Christianity too casually – with nonchalance. Saint Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians, encourages us to put on God's armor so that we will be able to stand safe against all the strategies and tricks of Satan. We are encouraged to use every piece of God's armor available to us.

"Self-centeredness, inhibited love, and nonchalance – three sins from within that endanger Christianity. And so, we return to our question, 'Are Christians an endangered species?' Some are and some are not. Although we have the promise of God that the light will never go completely out, our task together with the total church is to make sure we shine brightly. We continue to do battle with the forces of evil from both without and from within. To plan to do less is to risk joining the list of endangered species."

Stewardship Corner

Guided by the Tithe

God has demonstrated His love for us by creating and redeeming us. A meaningful way we express our gratitude to God is though our faithful giving. By God's grace, we can make giving important, and, when we do, we give Him the glory and honor that He deserves. Faith enables us to give freely and generously. Our giving can have no greater foundation than the Gospel of forgiveness and God's promises.

In His Word, God gives us giving principles. We are called to give cheerfully, regularly, sacrificially, and proportionately of our firstfruits. Even with all these giving principles, one question that all of us have likely asked is, "How much should I give?" In the Old Testament, God answered that question. God's people were commanded to tithe, which meant they were to give one-tenth of their crops, livestock, and gold and silver. The tithe does not answer the question, "Why give?" However, it does help to answer the question, "How much should I give?"

The Apostle Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 16:2, "On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper..." According to the income that we receive, we are to give proportionately. The tithe acts as a Biblical guide to calculate the dollar amount to give. Because Abraham, Jacob, and Moses tithed even before the law was given, could the tithe be a benchmark for us to consider as well?

In the New Testament, Jesus affirms the tithe when He told the Pharisees to continue tithing but not to neglect "the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness" (Matthew 23:23). It is interesting that, other than the tithe, the only giving referenced in the New Testament exceeded the tithe. Jesus asked His disciples to follow Him and leave everything they owned behind. He directed the Rich Young Ruler to give all His money away. Jesus commended the widow when she gave her last two mites. When He changed Zacchaeus' heart, Zacchaeus gave half of his wealth to the poor. Jesus said, "Freely you have received, freely give" (Matthew 10:8 NIV), and, in Acts 20:35, He said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

When we examine what we give, remember that God wants our hearts more than our gifts. May God grant us hearts of faith that give freely and generously.

We give You but Your own In any gifts we bring; All that we have is Yours alone, A trust from You, our King.

Mighty Mites at Work

We praise and thank our mighty God for His love and His grace so we can reach the National Mite Goal for 2023-2025!

This month as you put money into your mite container, say a prayer for National Mission Grant for Set Apart to Serve.

In the last 14 years, the LCMS has experienced a 59% decrease in their pre-seminary Concordia University enrollment along with a dramatic decrease in enrollment of other Christian education programs. The seminaries have experienced a combined decrease of 55% of those enrolled in the Master of Divinity degree.

Set Apart to Serve seeks to encourage and form new pastors and church workers to teach the saving faith to God's people, passing on the Christian faith from one generation to the next until our Savior's return.

The home, congregation, and Lutheran schools are the foundation of the church worker. Encouragement and mentoring from pastors, parents, Lutheran school teachers, and other church workers will help guide children to be Lutheran Christians who have the potential to serve as church workers.

This LWML mission grant of \$100,000 will assist in the funding of expenses associated with a broad, rigorously planned, and well-constructed, multi-year sustained effort across the LCMS, to affect a major positive, cultural change in the manner in which church worker vocations are perceived. Prospective students from the earliest years of their life in the family household — are encouraged and inspired to consider and appropriately prepare to serve the Church in lifelong professions that advance the Gospel and deliver God's mercy.
